During the summer the City continues to work on several roadway and sidewalk improvements throughout the area. ### **Tree Inventory Conducted**




Davey Resource Group recently completed a comprehensive inventory and assessment of a 3-acre wooded area in Veterans Memorial Park. Jacob McMains, Davey's certified arborist, identified the species, condition and maintenance needs as well as mapped the trees. The study

was partially funded by a Tree Resource Improvement and Maintenance (TRIM) grant from the Missouri Department of Conservation.

In total, 56 trees were identified: a variety of hackberry, hickory and oak as well as a few boxelder, black walnut, ash, black cherry and the American elm. The largest tree inventoried, a gold medal white oak, was 40" in diameter.

Next time you take a walk at Veterans Memorial Park, slow down to appreciate the trees, their diversity and usefulness, not to mention the comfort you find in the shade of their canopy.

Union is on track for a record breaking year in the number of building permits issued.

### Housing

Building permits are a leading indicator of new home construction. The City of Union building department issued 93 single family building permits valued at \$10,151,726 through the end of May. That is a 48% increase in the number of new single family homes over the same time period last year.

Of those 93 permits, 23 were for single family detached homes, most of which are under construction in St. Andrews Place, Union's largest subdivision.

Redbird Estates, a new R3 subdivision, accounts for the majority of the 36 single family attached homes. Redbird Estates is located off of Highway 50, west of Pro Body Works.

Developers are scurrying to keep up with the demand for senior housing. Denmark Villas is the latest 55+ community, accounting for 34 single family attached homes. Denmark Villas is located on Denmark Road, across from Stablestone Estates.

### **Commercial & Industrial Development**

### **Population Growth**

Union continues to be the fastest growing city in Franklin County, with a population of 11,524. According to the 2017 census population estimates, Union had an increase of 12.9% since 2010. Of the seven largest cities in Franklin County, only Pacific and Sullivan showed a population increase, 3% and 0.9%, respectively.

Beginning in November 2018, the Union City Lake will participate in the winter trout stocking program in cooperation with the Missouri Department of Conservation.
